# Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

## Statement of intent

### Pupil Premium Statement of Intent – Dame Dorothy Primary School

At Dame Dorothy Primary School, our vision is to ensure that every child, regardless of background, has the opportunity to achieve their full potential. We recognise that disadvantaged pupils may face additional barriers to learning, and we are committed to using Pupil Premium funding strategically to close the attainment gap between these pupils and their peers.

### Our Approach

We believe that high-quality teaching, targeted interventions, and a culture of high expectations are key to improving outcomes for disadvantaged pupils. Our strategy focuses on:

- **Early Intervention and Support:** Providing additional help as soon as gaps are identified.
- **Building Core Skills:** Ensuring pupils develop strong foundations in literacy and numeracy.
- **Flexible Delivery:** Adapting support to meet individual needs through a collaborative approach between teachers and teaching assistants.

### Intervention Classes

To address gaps in attainment, we have implemented **daily intervention sessions in both Key Stage 1 (Nest class) and Key Stage 2 (Hive class)**. These sessions aim to:

- Reinforce **basic literacy and numeracy skills**, enabling pupils to access the wider curriculum confidently.
- Provide **personalized support** for disadvantaged pupils who require additional help to keep pace with their peers.
- Use **teaching assistants working alongside class teachers** in a **flexible and fluid partnership**, ensuring interventions are responsive and integrated into classroom learning.

### Delivery Model

- Interventions are delivered **every day**, ensuring consistency and sustained progress.
- Teaching assistants collaborate closely with teachers to **identify needs, plan targeted activities, and monitor progress**.
- Sessions are **dynamic and adaptable**, allowing pupils to receive timely support without missing essential classroom learning.

## Expected Impact

Through this approach, we aim to:

- Narrow the attainment gap in reading, writing, and mathematics.
- Improve confidence and engagement among disadvantaged pupils.
- Ensure all pupils leave Dame Dorothy Primary School equipped with the skills they need for the next stage of their education.

## Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Oracy: From our assessments and observations it is clear that language skills and limited vocabulary are a key whole school focus for our children and particularly for those from a disadvantaged background.
2	Writing & grammar: Writing standards are below national expectations across all year groups and only 67% of pupils achieved the expected standard at the end of KS2 in 2025. A key focus of school improvement will be to implement the new writing framework strategy with external support.
3	Phonics: Phonics remains a core area for improvement in early years and KS1 to at least maintain outcomes at national expectations (81% at expected standard for 2025) and target support for disadvantaged groups to narrow the gap to their peers.
4	Health & Well-being: Using our newly awarded Beacon school status for PE and activity to embed a culture of daily activity and physical challenge to promote mental health and well-being for all learners. Establishing an inclusive and active breakfast club for all with affordable extended school opportunities until 5:30pm every day. These initiatives will be measured against improving attendance outcomes for all groups of pupils from just below national average figures in 2024/25 to above in 2025/26.
5	Wider Curriculum: Continue to provide experiences and cultural opportunities to all children beyond the confines of the classroom through visits. All children from disadvantaged backgrounds in Y4-6 to be provided with residential opportunities and aspirational ideas. This is to help narrow the attainment and attendance gap with our disadvantaged pupils and their peers. Updating technology opportunities for all children through access to new IT equipment that equips them to develop skills for an ever-changing workplace.

## Intended outcomes

This explains the outcomes we are aiming for **by the end of our current strategy plan**, and how we will measure whether they have been achieved.

Oracy: Lead staff member to complete action plan and attend several days of CPD to give clear progression, coverage and expectations to school	School will be able to evidence new approaches to oracy delivery through an action plan and training for all staff, that provides clarity and progression.
Writing and grammar: Staff have completed training through the literacy and Trust lead to effectively deliver writing across all key stages.	End of year writing outcomes are showing an increase in the number of disadvantaged children achieving the expected standard in all year groups.
Phonics: All children receive daily phonics teaching within small groups and those identified as struggling with reading receive additional daily support.	End of KS1 90% of children have passed their phonics screening test by July 2026. By the end of KS2 all children are confident and competent readers.
Well-being: To provide regular emotional well-being support for all of our pupils through dedicated opportunities and themed days in addition to our PSHE curriculum	Role as a Beacon School for PE and activity demonstrates the impact on all children, captured through pupil surveys.
Wider Curriculum: To provide as many opportunities as possible for new experiences through curriculum linked visits. New IT equipment is in place to support learning opportunities.	All children (regardless of background) will have had multiple opportunities to participate in rich cultural experiences through visits in the locality and further afield.

## Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

### Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2024 to 2025 academic year.

We have analysed the performance of our school's disadvantaged pupils during the previous academic year, drawing on national assessment data and our own internal summative and formative assessments.

Data for KS1 phonics has shown a rising 2-year trend from 60% in 2023 to 81% 2025. The conclusion of the Westgarth Hub programme to deliver Read, Write, Inc has had a positive impact on outcomes and demonstrates an effective use of the pupil premium spend.

Intervention programmes were timetabled daily to support disadvantaged pupils for phonics interventions, reading strategies and number fluency by careful deployment of staffing. Results for reading and writing are still below national expectations for 2025.

As a result we have reviewed our approach for 2025/26 to introduce a new writing framework with comprehensive CPD for all staff to ensure consistency of delivery.
